t was a case of back to the future for the owners of this coastal home near Torquay in Victoria. Seven years ago, they bought an early 1980s clinker-brick bungalow. Entirely original, it was a tantalising time capsule, with soaring timber ceilings, split levels, wood veneers and a breezy open-plan layout – all throwbacks to that bold and buoyant decade.

"We absolutely loved all those mid-century elements and the northern orientation," says the owner. But sadly, the couple were less enamoured of the lashings of mission brown, the salmon drapes and the apricot walls that were part of the package. And the three bedrooms were quite small with low ceilings, while storage was in short supply.


So, in 2020, they enlisted the services of Heartly principal interior designer Mikayla Rose – happily discovered through the pages of *Inside Out* – and building designer Luke Jennings of Project Now to transport the house into the 21st century, with a stylish makeover that honoured its past while embracing the future. "They liked the charm and qualities of the original house and wanted to retain its character," says Mikayla, "but it also had to be a contemporary home for a family with two young boys. They are all very active and surf, so it had to function accordingly."

"We wanted a parents' retreat, bigger bedrooms for the boys and more storage – including a mud room for sports gear and all the other things that accumulate at the front door!" adds the owner. "The kitchen and living areas had to feel connected, but we still needed break-away spaces. And the house had to be geared for easy entertaining, with doors that open right up, connecting indoors and out."

In an inspired example of architectural recycling, Luke and Mikayla retained the central core, with the open-plan living areas along the northern side and three bedrooms and service areas on a split level along the southern side. They then tweaked the floor plan to include a mud room beside the entry in place of an office. "It's the mother of all mud rooms, with lots of generous shelves. The family can just dump stuff in there — and sand stays there, too," says Mikayla.

Luke also expanded the house at each side, converting the garage beside the entry into a self-contained guest suite and adding a new wing on the opposite end for a parents' retreat. A separate building houses a cabana beside the pool and garage.







The home's original assets, such as the open-plan layout, floor-to-ceiling glazing, clerestory windows and crossventilation, were used to the full, with none of the openings needing to be enlarged, although they were replaced with black powdercoated aluminium. "The new windows have high-performing double-glazing, a significant improvement over the original thin glazing," says Luke.


Meanwhile, the design duo moved the kitchen from the northern wall and flipped it so the space embraces an island and an informal dining area, both of which look out to the gum trees. "The kitchen floats between two nib walls, with two original beams darkened to match the new joinery," says Mikayla. "The materiality in the kitchen provides a focal point – we needed it to have a bit of spunk." Hence the green finger tiles, Dekton benchtop, dark veneer on the joinery and the original beamed ceiling soaring overhead.

Materiality was key to the makeover, says Mikayla. Externally, the new sections are clad in shou sugi ban charred timbers that freshen the untouched clinker bricks in the central section. Inside, tatty carpets were replaced with bare timbers and limestone. Timber veneer, limestone and the kitchen tiles are nods to the past, but their hues are of the minute. "We agonised about whether to paint over that incredible timber ceiling, but it needed to be lightened up because the honey timbers wouldn't cut it for the fresh new look," says Mikayla. "The earthy palette, with white and black accents, is crisper and more up to date than the muddy browns of the past. And the accent green tile brings in the ocean, just 500 metres away." Strikingly, a bricktile foyer, reprised in the fireplace with its handsome cast-iron firebox, echoes the original exterior. In the bathrooms, terrazzo is "a throwback to the original era", she says. "It has a timeless quirk to it, teamed with aged brass tapware and wall sconces."

The furniture, too, is a nod to the property's original era. "There's a 1970s vibe going on with the sofa and bar stools – fun pieces that bring in warm rusty reds teamed with natural leather," says Mikayla, who is hard-pressed to find a favourite feature in a home full of nice surprises. "I love the entry with the brickwork and brick tiles, and the ceiling and the natural light. There is a sense of fascination, a story being told in the way the materials are revealed and repeated."

"We just love the variety of the materials and textures," adds the owner, summing up the family's admiration of the new home that deftly straddles the decades.
